Dioceses, Archdioceses, and Everything in Between

Though it happens infrequently in the United States, at times a diocese can be merged with another diocese, or a diocese can be elevated to an archdiocese because of its growing size, prominence, and service. In 2020, the Diocese of Juneau was merged with the Archdiocese of Anchorage, which then became the Archdiocese of Anchorage-Juneau. In Texas, back in 2004, the then-Diocese of Galveston-Houston was elevated to the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston.

In early 2023, the bishops of Ohio initiated a discussion, still ongoing, regarding merging the Diocese of Steubenville and the Diocese of Columbus.

The U.S. bishops have also sent a recommendation to Rome for the Diocese of Las Vegas to be elevated to an archdiocese. On May 30, 2023, Pope Francis confirmed and accepted this recommendation, establishing the Archdiocese of Las Vegas.

The Catholic School Effect?

Decades of research led to the moniker "the Catholic school effect" to highlight the social and academic outcomes of attending a Catholic school rather than the local public school. James Coleman and Andrew Greeley, among others, documented supportive findings for many years.

Recently, new studies have not evinced such a difference, suggesting perhaps a need to commit anew to better data gathering, analysis, and assessment in Catholic schools. While there are certainly religious, spiritual, and moral outcomes that are desired by parents who send their children to Catholic schools, academic results remain a high priority.
