The Office of Teaching Initiatives will review CTLE/TEACH requirements for educators practicing in religious and independent schools. We will provide instructions on how educators can re-register in the TEACH system and will review the requirements for schools' access to the TEACH system. If time remains, recent changes to certification will be discussed, including Literacy All Grades, Students with Disabilities All Grades, and recent changes to the Endorsement of an Out of State Certificate.
This project is designed to collaborate with educational leaders in all NYS schools (public, religious, and independent) on identifying and using primary-based sources to teach about Jews and Judaism. Our goals are to provide support in creating K-12 environments where learners of diverse religious backgrounds can feel safe and welcome and ensure that students are equipped with the tools to address identitybased hate, both now and also when they are in the post-secondary world after graduation.
