2023 - The Year of School Choice

The COVID pandemic that so radically interrupted the academic calendar and typical classroom instruction in the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school years continues to shape policy discussions and legislative action. Providing parents with more choices, i.e., funded choices, remains a high priority for state legislatures around the country. In 2023, 17 states have passed measures either establishing or expanding such options.

Whether in the form of tax credits, vouchers, or educational savings accounts (ESAs), these programs allow parents to access funds to send their children to alternatives outside their local public school, such as Catholic schools, charter schools, or even homeschooling.

Changes to Equitable Services Resulting from New Guidance

Keeping Younger Students Back a Grade Shows Benefits

Few challenges are more perplexing to both teachers and parents than asking a low-performing student to repeat a grade. However, a recent study suggests that directing younger students to master fundamental material before moving on may be beneficial overall to their reading and math performance.

Researchers evaluated the effects of grade retention on students' academic, attendance, and disciplinary outcomes. Findings revealed that third grade retention increases achievement in English Language Arts (ELA) and math immediately and substantially, and the effects persist into middle school. No evidence of grade retention effects on student attendance or disciplinary incidents were found.

Artificial Intelligence (AI)

When ChatGPT first appeared in November 2022, excitement swept through the world of technology. Business titans, political leaders, educators, and parents all expressed concern about the potential adverse effects of such technology, even while simultaneously being amazed at its abilities. Now, several new Al applications have arrived with a specific focus on church-related activities and information.

Magisterium AI can answer questions about church teaching and practices, helping to explain complex theological concepts in simple, understandable language. It is also well versed in church history and philosophy. With its ability to summarize church teaching, it can be used to create educational resources.

Catholic Chat is focused on The Catechism of the Catholic Church and allows users to interact with this repository of church teaching through questions, searches, comparisons, and other general inquiries. It is also able to respond at three distinct levels of sophistication: Child; Simple and easy to understand; and Adult.


<u>Text with Jesus</u> is downloadable app that is Al-powered, offering responses to queries based on the Bible and biblical figures. Users can select their own faith tradition to guide the doctrines and beliefs expressed.

High Quality Research on Catholic Schools

The *Journal of Catholic Education* (formerly Catholic Education: A Journal of Inquiry and Practice), is managed and edited by the University of Notre Dame and digitally hosted by Loyola Marymount University. An open access journal representing Catholic colleges and universities, Catholic education leaders, and scholars from a variety of disciplines, the journal is committed to contributing research and encouraging best practice in Catholic elementary, secondary, and higher education by advancing the field of Catholic educational research.

Special Education Numbers Soar

The number of students in special education in the USA has risen dramatically over the past four decades. In the 2021-22 school year, 7.3 million students, or 14.7 percent of all public school students nationwide, needed special education services. In 2011-12, that share was about 13 percent of all students, and back in 1976-77, the first year when the U.S. Department of Education collected these data following the 1975 passage of the Education for all Handicapped Children Act, students in special education made up but 8 percent of the overall student population, or 3.6 million students. In 45 years, the special education population has effectively doubled.

Global Researchers Advancing Catholic Education (G.R.A.C.E)

Global Researchers Advancing Catholic Education (G.R.A.C.E.) is a new international research project and community of practice dedicated to expanding the knowledge base of Catholic educational research around the globe. Five institutions are leading this effort: Boston College in the USA; Mary Immaculate College in Limerick, Ireland; The University of Notre Dame Australia; Saint Mary's University in the UKJ; and the International Office of Catholic Education in Rome. Job-Embedded Coaching

Though many find the concept of coaching as being the sole domain of athletic activities, instructional coaching of teachers has become a highly effective tool in supporting academic growth. Research consistently shows that teachers–particularly new teachers–who collaborate closely with instructional coaches are more likely to remain with their schools. School leaders can also benefit from coaching, particularly in setting strategic goals, managing conflict, and overseeing major transitions.

Job-embedded coaching is a real-time, in-the-moment support system for leaders and teachers as they strive to continuously improve classroom management, practices, and results.

Working closely with instructional leadership teams, coaches help to create a highly collaborative and personalized plan—one that is specifically designed to improve conditions for teaching and learning in your schools and to help teachers and leaders achieve positive student outcomes.
